What Is The Lamb Center?

The Lamb Center (TLC) is a daytime drop-in shelter for poor and homeless individuals in Fairfax, Virginia. Since opening its doors in 1992, thousands of guests have been welcomed and served. Currently, over 100 guests are served each day. The Lamb Center relies on the Lord's provision, and each day's operation is a miracle of service and spiritual nourishment and renewal.

Through the mighty efforts of TLC staff and volunteer churches and individuals:

- gallons of coffee, tables full of breakfast foods, hot lunches and hearty snacks are served,
- three washers and four dryers operate full time,
- **five showers** are used throughout the day,
- TLC **computers** are available for those seeking work, documentation, or staying in touch with family and friends,
- **spiritual support** is provided in an ongoing series of Bible studies at the large central table, chapel services, prayers, and counseling, and
- TLC skilled staff provide recovery and employment counseling, fellowship, and case management.



What Happens at The Lamb Center?

In addition to the meals, laundry, showers, counseling, there is much more. A few examples:

People are valued - The Lord calls staff and volunteers to walk through deep valleys with the guests and to shout from the mountaintops when success takes place. In December, the TLC Director asked one of the guests to leave for the day due to intoxication. The guest returned sober the next morning and blessed staff and volunteers as he left for work ringing bells for the Salvation Army.

The Gospel is shared and next steps are celebrated – After Bible Study one day, a staff member saw God working in our midst as she was able to tell a guest that he was approved to move into Mondloch House (a small new supportive housing unit). Our guest, "Peter" had been at The Lamb Center for about six months, but he had been homeless since he lost his housing three years ago. Because of untreated mental health problems, Peter didn't understand how he became homeless. He longed to be in a safe environment. As the staff member drove Peter to Mondloch House that Monday, Christ was present in this 'loving, life-giving and restoring' relationship.

Volunteers are blessed – TLC volunteers give sacrificially of their time and their hearts. They show God's love in real and practical ways. The vast majority come here with the idea of giving back to the "least of us" and to minister to the poor and poor in spirit. What they all find is they get so much more out of it than they give.






What's Ahead for The Lamb Center?

After an exhaustive search for a new home, The Lamb Center has finally reached an agreement to purchase a building near the current location. This new home will provide more space to better serve our guests. The needs for increased space include having locations for case managers, job counselors, and social workers to talk with individuals and small groups. The journey has lasted over five years and is not yet over. The project will still need to get zoning approval, and strong financial support is needed. Income


2013 Total: \$1,087,447

God Sighting

On Monday mornings The Lamb Center often feels like Grand Central Station. Guests are moving about preparing to head out to work; Lamb Center staff are meeting to pray, share, and discuss matters for the coming week; volunteers are arriving; our nurse, psychiatric nurse practitioner and social worker play musical chairs for office space with staff; and the Lord is at work, in our thoughts, words, and deeds.

A few weeks ago, a guest entered the TLC office to request that a staff member phone the authorities in order for him to turn himself in, as he had missed a court date and was now "wanted." The assistant director placed the appropriate phone calls and asked a volunteer to join her in praying for this guest. Their hearts broke as the guest rode away in the police car, and he remained in their hearts and prayers. He returned to The Lamb Center on a busy Monday a few weeks later with a gleam in his eye. "I'm back, thank you for the prayers and for welcoming me back to The Lamb Center. Those prayers carried me through my time in jail and I made it."
